One of Canada's top universities, Trent is renowned as a leader in Indigenous education. With deep roots in reconciliation, Trent incorporates the teachings and perspectives of Elders and cultural leaders into our academic and extracurricular programming.

Trent's groundbreaking leadership in Indigenous Studies dates back 60 years – to our beginnings, when we became the first university in Canada (and only the second in North America) to establish an Indigenous Studies academic department. The department is now known as the Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies.

Here, in the Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies, we think differently, and inspire our students to do the same. We invite you to explore our history of leadership and join our extraordinary community of scholars to continue this legacy and make a difference in our world.

ABOUT CHANIE WENJACK

Chanie Wenjack was a young Anishinaabe boy from Ogoki Post in Marten Falls in northern Ontario. He attended Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School near Kenora. Chanie attended the school for two years and ran away on October 16, 1966. He was headed home when he died of exposure on October 23, 1966 on the railway tracks near Redditt, Ontario, the home of his uncle.

Chanie is the namesake of Trent University's Wenjack Theatre and the Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies – as an homage to his flight to safety, and the safe space created for Indigenous Knowledges, perspectives and communities at Trent.

Trent University respectfully acknowledges it is located on the treaty and traditional territory of the Michi Saagig Anishinaabeg. We offer our gratitude to First Peoples for their care for, and teachings about, our earth and our relations. May we honour those teachings.

Enwayaang

At Trent, you will thrive and benefit from an academic and supportive environment where Indigenous Knowledge is respected and recognized as a means by which to understand the world.

- Learn from Indigenous and non-Indigenous faculty members, and interact with Elders and Knowledge Holders
- Spend a semester studying abroad in one of Trent's 35 partner countries
- Engage in research projects that may benefit your community
- Experience cross-cultural learning, and the interaction of Indigenous and Euro-centric Knowledge systems and approaches

The concept of understanding the world in multiple ways is inherent in Indigenous ways of knowing and pedagogies. Haudenosaunee people describe this concept in their two row wampum teachings, Mi'kmaq refer to this as "two eyed seeing," and Dene refer to this concept as "strong like two."



Traditional Teachings

Traditional teachings are shared by Elders, Knowledge Holders, and other Indigenous community members in an informal setting throughout the year. You will have the opportunity to participate in traditional teachings, Elder roundtable workshops, social gatherings, hands-on learning workshops, and one-on-one cultural counselling on campus.

First Peoples House of Learning

The First Peoples House of Learning (FPHL) provides support services to prospective and current Indigenous students at Trent University's campuses in Peterborough and Durham. FPHL collaborates with students to support their academic success and personal development.

Incoming Indigenous students are given the opportunity to self-identify their Indigenous ancestry, ensuring they are connected to our cultural, academic, and support services.

FPHL offers a wide range of inclusive supports and services for your time at Trent, including:

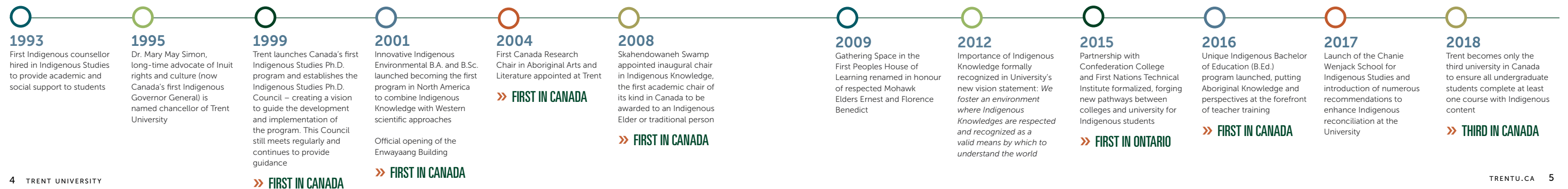
- Culturally-informed counselling services tailored to Indigenous needs
- Wraparound academic supports for Indigenous students – from application and admission through to graduation, including course registration, academic planning, tutoring, skills workshops, career counselling, and coaching
- Financial supports for Indigenous students through our Naadaamegewin (the Art of Giving) program including grants, bursaries, and scholarships
- Mentorship and peer support for all Indigenous students, including Foundations of Indigenous Learning diploma program students
- Student ambassadors who work year-round to extend a welcoming hand to the community fostered by FPHL

- Skills workshops designed for the Indigenous learner
- Cultural workshops and supports including ceremonies, talking circles, visiting Elders, traditional teachings, ribbon shirt and skirt making, drum making, and song learning
- Dedicated supports for Two-Spirit people, including workshops and training for workplaces and organizations
- Educational sessions and workshops on Indigenous history and experience that bring empathy, understanding, and healing from an Indigenous perspective
- FPHL offers opportunities at Trent's Peterborough and Durham GTA campuses to improve awareness of Indigenous Culture and Knowledges and engage in reconciliation in a comfortable, supportive environment.

Ishkodehwin: Anishnaabemowin for "Lighting your Inner Fire"

At Trent, you will find a community of support amongst your fellow students. Ishkodehwin is an on-campus student mentorship program that takes place throughout the academic year. Upper-year students act as peer support for new students to assist them in their transition to Trent. The program is open to all first-year students who identify as First Nation (Status or Non-Status), Métis or Inuit.

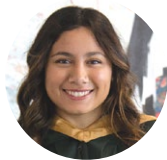

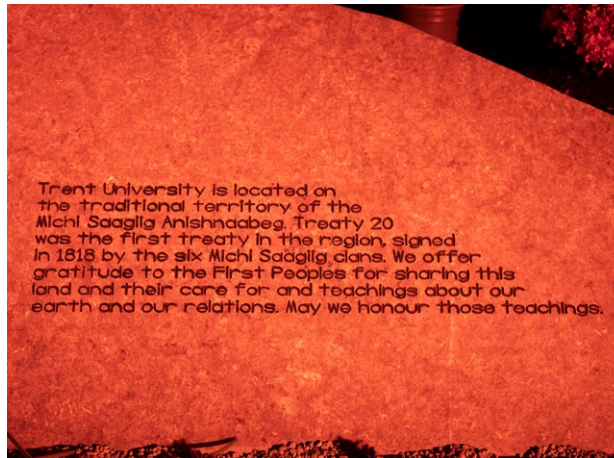

01 Giizhigaatig (Cedar Room) in Bata Library
Giizhigaatig – the name chosen by local Elders for an Indigenous reading room in the Bata Library – means honouring the sacred cedar tree. With resources and space for students, Giizhigaatig is supported by the legacy of former Board chair Jalynn H. Bennett, and honours and recognizes local Michi Saagiig culture on campus.

02 Ernest and Florence Benedict Gathering Space
This hub of activity is a bright and comfortable space where all are welcome. Here, students study and take part in an array of activities including ceremonies, socials, and workshops.

04 Nozhem: First Peoples Performance Space
This space on campus is a one-of-a-kind venue designed to allow the audience to interact with artists and performers. Unlike a traditional Western theatre, the space is designed to host ceremonies and to nurture Indigenous oral tradition, language, and knowledge.

05 Mnidoowag A'Kiing (the Spirit Lands)
Trent University has a sweat lodge, three tipis, and a traditional wigwam between both the Peterborough and Durham GTA campuses, which serve as spaces for students to learn about ceremony and cultural teachings. The tipis also act as classroom space. Students are greeted by volunteer fire keepers who are trained in cultural protocol, safety, and are ambassadors for the space.

06 Indigenous Spaces at our Durham Campus
At the Durham Greater Toronto Area campus you will find dedicated spaces for gathering and supporting cultural learning and activities, including a tipi, an Indigenous Student Study Room and Medicine Garden, all supported through the First Peoples House of Learning.

DIPLOMA PROGRAMS

Our exceptional Indigenous diploma programs provide an alternate path to Trent for self-identifying First Nations, Métis, or Inuit students who wish to make the transition into university level studies. Students in the **Foundations of Indigenous Learning** and the **Indigenous Environmental Studies** diplomas bring their diverse cultures, values, histories, and languages to the classroom while becoming career-ready and/or prepared to pursue further studies at the undergraduate level and beyond.

Indigenous students can prepare for a future in healthcare, and gain university credit, with the **Foundations of Indigenous Studies for Future Nursing Students Diploma** program. Students completing the diploma who meet the requirements are admitted to the compressed Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.Sc.N.) degree.

Canadian Studies & Indigenous Studies M.A.

Drawing on the expertise and knowledges of a richly diverse humanities and social sciences faculty, students accepted to this M.A. program will have the opportunity to explore and research key themes in Canadian Studies and/or Indigenous Studies.

Indigenous Studies Ph.D.

A Canadian first, this innovative Ph.D. program offers Indigenous and non-Indigenous students an opportunity to engage in advanced learning experiences grounded in Indigenous cultures and reflecting the interaction between traditional and contemporary Indigenous Knowledges within the academic context. Students have a choice of two options to complete their dissertation: a monograph or a Knowledge Basket.

Canadian Studies Ph.D.

Our Canadian Studies Ph.D. program fosters a diverse approach to the critical conversations connected to Canada, while developing expertise in research-intensive study as part of the only interdisciplinary Canadian Studies doctorate program in Canada.

Sustainability Studies M.A.

This first-of-its-kind program is renowned for developing leaders in the field who can actively advance research and practice in critical sustainability-based challenges, including environmental protection, resource conservation, and positive social change.

RESEARCH & PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CENTRES

Faculty in the Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies are working to further our understandings of Indigenous Peoples and their Knowledges, cultures, and practices through three research centres associated with the School.

Boodweh Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages

As a catalyst for new research, the Boodweh Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages connects the University, local communities, and Elders in collaborative initiatives related to the exchange of Indigenous research and scholarship.

Enwayaang Institute for Professional Learning

The Enwayaang Professional Institute for Learning offers certificate courses for professionals who are looking to broaden and deepen their knowledge with respect to Indigenous Peoples, Indigenous languages, and Indigenous/non-Indigenous relations.

Indigenous Environmental Institute

The Indigenous Environmental Institute (IEI) broadens the impact of Trent University's leadership in Indigenous Environmental Studies and Sciences (IESS). Positioned to bolster IESS as a discipline and practice, IEI creates and holds space for collaborations and research that bring together Indigenous and Euro-centric Knowledge systems.

ONTARIO HIGH SCHOOL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Ontario secondary school students are required to have the following for admission to all programs:

- Ontario Secondary School Diploma with a minimum of six grade 12 4U or 4M courses
- A minimum 70% overall final average calculated using the top six grade 12 4U or 4M courses unless otherwise specified
- ENG4U with a minimum grade of 60%

PATHWAYS FOR INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

There are two application pathways if you are an Indigenous student:

1. Degree Program

Indigenous students who have followed a standard academic path are eligible to apply to Trent directly through the degree program application process. All Indigenous applicants are encouraged to contact fphenrolment@trentu.ca to activate admission and application assistance, and connection to FPHL's support services.

2. Indigenous Diploma Programs

Application to the diploma program can be made in the following ways:

- By submitting an online application through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC), as well as the Indigenous Diploma Supplemental Application Form directly through your myTrent portal.
- By contacting FPHL's Enrolment Advisor – fphenrolment@trentu.ca – for a free direct application.
